Funder Spotlight



Paso del Norte Health Foundation

CAASNM continues to be grateful for the Paso del Norte Health Foundation's six years of support for our Kids Can Youth Entrepreneur Program. Since 2019, the Health Foundation has generously invested nearly \$1 million to scale Kids Can from a volunteer-driven initiative into a regional Out-of-School time powerhouse, now employing seven staff members and serving youth across Doña Ana, Luna, and Otero counties. This growth has enabled Kids Can to offer entrepreneurship training to over 600 youth annually through after-school programs, summer camps, and business fairs, including hands-on initiatives like the Las Cruces Farmer's Market Vendor Jr. Vendors Program.

Empowerment Congress

The Empowerment Congress of Doña Ana County trains and encourages ordinary citizens to make meaningful change in their communities, many in the County's colonias, and advocate for community improvements.



In response to ongoing issues

with arsenic-contaminated and discolored water, Empowerment Congress played a pivotal role in mobilizing residents of Sunland Park and Santa Teresa to demand accountability from the local authority.

Empowerment Congress led a bilingual community teach-in on the health risks of arsenic and how to read water bills, arming residents with critical knowledge and tools to advocate for themselves.

Alberto Zavala

Alberto Zavala is the Program Coordinator of the Healthy Kids Healthy Preschool program at CAASNM. He has been working for over five years in the early childhood education field providing technical assistance, resources and training to child development centers, HeadStart and pre-schools in all 23 counties in New Mexico to develop healthy eating and active living practices as part of children's daily routines. Farm-to-Preschool is just the program's latest initiative, encouraging young children to grow healthy produce to eat and take to market.

Coats for Kids

Coats for Kids ended 30 years at CAASNM providing warm winter coats for area children. Since its beginning, coats have been provided to over 70,000 children and last year Coats for Kids gave away 2,700. CAASNM team members Llajaira Jimenez and Elda Cordero, Knights of Columbus volunteer Narciso Holguin, Comet Cleaners and business partner Alycia Jameson at D2 Designs all made warm winters possible.



A Success Story

Child and Adult Food Care Program CACFP



Dina started with four children caring for them in her house. Under the Child and Adult Food Care Program, she started to understand the childcare business better and became a licensed provider and started caring for more children. Working with children so much, she started to save her money to open her own formal daycare center. From a modest beginning, she became one of the largest centers in Sunland Park with a capacity of 140 children. She has since opened two more centers, one in Santa Teresa with the capacity of 89 kids and another one in Chaparral with the capacity of 42.



Family Prosperity—status:



Family Prosperity is ongoing, well over halfway through to completion. There continue to be 150 members receiving cash transfers as part of the program. Survey responses have been factored into a first six-month evaluation, and these families are seeing real benefits to their overall health, well-being, and peace of mind. We continue to hear some amazing stories of families bettering themselves and improving their outlook through the program. Some families are attending financial education classes. The three partners of this project are CAASNM, FYI+ (Families and Youth Plus) and Jardin de los Niños as well as many other community partners providing direct services.



82 individuals opened a savings account or Individual Development Account

489 community members increased their income or hours worked through help from CAA programs

1453 improved mental and behavioral health and 2789 increased their physical health



1317 increased their nutrition skills including cooking, shopping and growing food

4025 received CAA case management services, and 5441 were given referrals to CAA community partners

A Success Story

Adriana, 35, is in the process of getting her home health business off the ground and running, as well as attending relevant classes. In her words, she is seeking to better circumstances for herself and her family and develop the independence that business ownership brings. Utilities for her business and home have been a hardship, and she has been using her Family Prosperity monthly income to pay for them. This has greatly reduced her level of stress so that she can concentrate on her business and coursework.



Thriving Kids growth

Thriving Kids is CAASNM's robust home visiting program accredited by the international, evidence-based model, Parents as Teachers (PAT). Thriving Kids serves mostly low-families with children 0-5 to improve parenting and enhance connectivity. From a very modest base serving 50 families with 3 home visitor staff, Thriving Kids now provides parenting resources to 250 individuals across three school districts with a team of 14.

Thriving Kids is moving forward with the process of becoming a PAT blue ribbon program, recognizing those affiliates who have achieved the highest fidelity to the PAT model.



Housing and Family Support Services Help Hundreds

Melissa Toledo-Ontiveros MA, MCJ, MPA developed the Thriving Families program, a whole-family approach, and serves as its Program Director. Melissa's leadership and experience come from various direct service roles: case manager, school counselor, and mental and behavioral therapist. In her role, she also directs Housing Stability and Family Support programs at CAASNM. Family Supports provide critical support ensuring families are safe and supported. The Housing Stability program across several counties offers families a secure foundation, reducing stress and enabling them to focus on building stronger, more vibrant households and communities



A Success Story

At 73, Rosa made the difficult decision to leave an unsafe living situation in Deming. With limited options, she stayed in a local motel while figuring out her next steps. When she connected with CAASNM's housing stability program, she worked with a housing navigator to explore resources available to her and apply for programs that aligned with her needs and goals.

Today, Rosa has settled into a safe senior apartment with supportive landlords — a place where she can focus on the next chapter of her life with stability and peace of mind.



Kids Can Youth Entrepreneur Program



2024 proved to be a remarkable year for the Kids Can Youth Entrepreneur Program, marking significant achievements and growth. Its school programs flourished with both returning and new participants, while summer camps expanded across Doña Ana and Otero

Counties, engaging a diverse group of young entrepreneurs. The Mall Pop-Up events at Mesilla Valley Mall provided a platform for budding business minds to showcase their talents and products. The popular Jr. Vendor program thrived, welcoming enthusiastic new members eager to learn and grow. Looking ahead, Kids Can is excited to continue fostering entrepreneurial spirit and community involvement among its youth.
